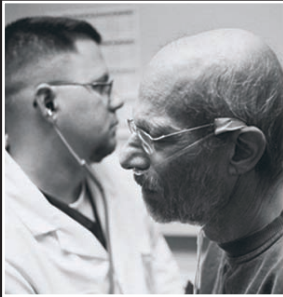

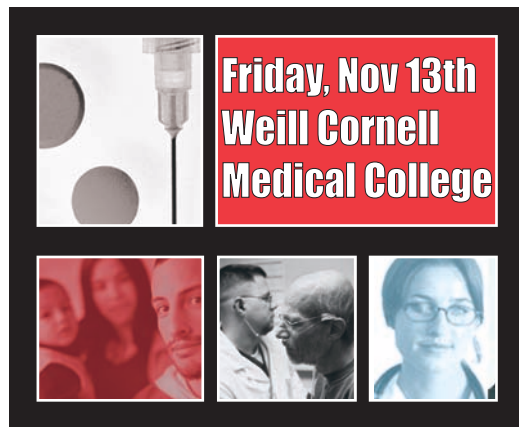

STATEMENT OF NEED: Advances in the treatment of HIV infection over the past several years have changed the way we view the management of the HIV-infected patient. With the advent of more precise diagnosis tools and more potent antiretroviral drugs, the prognosis for millions of patients infected with HIV has changed. The medical community continues to investigate and develop new treatment methods, creating a higher demand for up-to-date information.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course seeks to address the following questions through expert lectures followed by dynamic roundtable discussions:

1. When is the optimal time to initiate antiretroviral therapy?
2. What are the advantages and disadvantages of various first line antiretroviral regimens?
3. What's new in the area of drug-drug interactions?
4. What does the pipeline of anti-HCV drugs look like in 2009?
5. Is curing HIV a realistic goal for the future?
6. What is the current status of clinical trials of pre- and post-exposure prophylaxis to prevent HIV transmission?

1. Clearly present controversies and strategies in the management of the HIV infected patient.
